"Wreaths Across America" is an organization that puts together a variety of events including international veteran's tributes, ceremonies at State Houses and a week-long



Through purchasing, shoppers earn opportunities to win special Christmas items such as custom-made wreaths. A Poinsettia Extravaganza for Holiday Fundraising

The volunteers of Metroplex Hospital, in Killeen, TX are constantly seeking new ways to generate money for our scholarships and funding projects. The Poinsettia Extravaganza is one of our most successful efforts—made so by the creativity and hard work of our gift shop volunteers and a few extra recruits.

Beginning in November, the volunteers set the schedule for ordering and picking up the poinsettias. Shoppers can place orders beginning the last week of November through the week before Christmas and pick up their orders on specific Wednesdays in December. We advertise our sale through the hospital intranet, newsletter, and flyers posted and delivered throughout the hospital. We make it easy for buyers to order by providing order forms and delivery services. Then, when we're all set . . . let the madness begin!

The "naked" poinsettias are delivered early on Wednesday mornings and, sustained by coffee, the workers congregate waiting for instructions from our leader, Sue Dunlap. We use an assembly line approach in preparing the poinsettias—GMC's auto plants have nothing on us! Some of the preparation is done in advance, including cutting the cellophane to line the pot holders and making bows to grace each pot. Each Wednesday when poinsettias are received, the assembly line is set up in the hospital lobby with stations for each task—remove plastic covers, put flowers in cellophane and foil pots, hot glue ribbons and bows, add gold picks, spray with glitter, and organize for pick up.

Those gift shop volunteers are pros at "dressing" the poinsettias. They know just where to put the picks and can get those bows glued on in a flash. Then, there are the rest of us florally-challenged "extra recruits," who, left unattended, might create a disaster. (Think preschoolers as floral artists!) Here's where that spray glitter comes in. If you are without talent (as I am), you are allowed to haul those mobile shelves full of poinsettias outside to be sprayed with glitter. (If anyone knows how to get spray glitter out of our vests, skin, hair, and eyeglasses, please, let me know.) Finally, the finished products are counted, organized, and labeled by buyer and the buyers are called to pick up their purchases. And, we're ready to start again on the next Wednesday.



Health Care in the 84th Texas Legislature

The opening day of the 84th Texas Legislature was Jan. 13. That Tuesday kicked off 140 frenzied days of policy making and politicking. By June 1, the legislature will likely have considered more than 6,000 bills on any number of topics from water and education to fracking and

homeschooling.

It could choose to reject all of those bills, but one is a must pass. The Legislature is constitutionally required to send a balanced state budget to the governor. The budget lays out revenue and expenditures for state agency operations for the next two years.

A deceptively simple requirement, achieving a balanced state budget requires major work, negotiation and choices. Lawmakers have to make tough decisions about what to fund and at what level.

At more than one-third of the state's budget, health care is a significant presence in budget discussions. Keeping health care costs from consuming a larger share of the state budget is always a legislative priority. Texas hospitals and other health care providers, however, cannot sustain additional funding cuts. Since 2011, Medicaid reimbursement has been slashed by 10 percent. Rates are well below cost. For most hospitals, reimbursement for inpatient services is less than 50 percent of cost and for outpatient services is less than 72 percent. At the same time, the number of uninsured residents in Texas remains persistently high, leaving hospitals with a massive shortfall.

Adequate funding is critical for quality patient care. Without it, hospitals cannot continue to invest in patient safety and quality initiatives, hire sufficient staff to care for a growing population or prepare for emergencies, which, as the recent Ebola crisis has shown, is paramount for every hospital. In some communities, hospitals could be forced to close their doors, leaving residents without a local hospital.

As lawmakers debate the budget, Texas hospitals will be asking that they protect health care by reducing the number of uninsured and appropriating the required funds to adequately fund Medicaid payments.

One in four Texans has no health insurance. During the 84th legislative session, lawmakers have the opportunity to make a big dent in this number. They can develop a private health insurance program for Texans who earn too much to qualify for Medicaid but too little to qualify for subsidized coverage through the Marketplace and who do not have access to insurance through their employers. Such a program would allow 1.1 million uninsured, low-wage working Texans to purchase affordable private health insurance.

The other priority is to secure the necessary state appropriations to adequately fund Medicaid hospital payments. This includes full state funding of supplemental payments and Medicaid reimbursement rates that more accurately reflect the cost of providing care.

Budgets are about choices. A healthy Texas depends on lawmakers making the right choices.

The trip began with 8 days at sea viewing nothing but water. With no rehab responsibilities yet, Dean worked from 0445-1830 on a galley team of 6 serving about 350 people. Once in port, set up and organized, they screened over 2000 people to find those they could help. About 200 passed pre-screening. Unfortunately there were hundreds that they could not help. Some of the children with club feet could be helped with casting, others with surgery. Dean, as physical therapist, was greatly involved in the recovery process which involved frequently changing casts, gaittraining, wedging casts, and taking x-rays are in order to assess progress. These people so appreciate the life-altering services they receive and form strong bonds with

their care giving teams. Parting can be difficult. Dean and Marcia will be involved again next year as they may return to Madagascar again.
