Fixing the Marketplace Ted Shaw THA President/CEO

On Nov. 1, the fourth enrollment period opens for uninsured Texans to purchase private health insurance through the federal health insurance market-place. This open enrollment period will

look different from previous ones in a couple of key ways.

First, Texas has made significant progress at reducing the number of uninsured. Although the state still leads the nation in the number and rate of uninsured, the proportion of Texans without health insurance has dropped from a high of 25 percent to just over 19 percent. This is progress.

However, the individuals who remain uninsured do so for a variety of complex reasons. And this creates challenges for increasing marketplace enrollment and further reducing the number of uninsured. New research from the Commonwealth Fund shows that the remaining eligible-butuninsured adults are disproportionately poor, young and Latino. They also are more likely to be unaware of the marketplace, coverage options and available subsidies to reduce the cost of coverage. This lack of awareness exists, despite three years of marketplace operations and intensive outreach and education efforts from community-based advocacy and social services groups, hospitals and health care systems and government entities. Figuring out how to reach these individuals and convince them of the need to purchase coverage is a significant challenge that is getting more difficult with time.

The second major difference between this year's open enrollment period and that of years past is the declining number of health insurers participating in the marketplace. Several large insurers — Aetna, United and Humana — all have cut back on their participation or pulled out of the marketplace entirely. Preliminary data on plan participation indicate that most Texas counties still will have at least two participating marketplace plans in 2017, but consumer choice is certainly diminished.

This reduction in choice is problematic because choice of plans is linked with competition and affordability. The Commonwealth Fund's research shows that 85 percent of individuals who sought coverage through the marketplace but ultimately did not obtain it did not follow through because they could not find an affordable plan. With major insurers dropping out, there is less competition, which potentially means higher premiums....and diminished affordability for consumers.

The American Hospital Association has proposed a number of common sense solutions to stabilize the marketplace and prevent further erosion of plan choice. These include limiting the use of special enrollment periods, further



refining the risk-adjustment program, allowing third-party payment of premiums, enhancing outreach and enrollment strategies, and supporting the development of state-level solutions. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services also has recognized the need to prevent additional marketplace instability and recently proposed several changes to improve the risk-adjustment program. There is not a single magic bullet to shore up the market

place, but there are a number of steps that can be taken before more plans drop out and consumers have even fewer choices. We shouldn't ignore what's happening with marketplace choice and wait for the problem to worsen before we take steps to address it.

Marketplace coverage is not perfect. But, it undoubtedly has had a positive impact on reducing the state's number of uninsured. Its imperfections are not fatal, and they can and should be fixed.

We were pleased to win **3rd Place** for our **tray favors** and **2nd Place** for our **newsletter**. We appreciate all who worked so hard on the convention!


