Though the program was wonderful and the luncheon delicious, I'd like to highlight the Hospitals of Providence Children's Hos-

pital at the Memorial Campus. The hall-ways had huge painted murals of sea life and panels of VERY colorful flowers as you can see in the photos to the right. Most impressive was their Child Life Program, which "empowers children"

and families". **Peggy Schuster** is a **Certified Child Life Specialist**, an expert in child development who works to ensure that life remains as normal as possible for children in health care settings and other challenging environments. She promotes effective coping through play, self-expression activities and age -appropriate medical preparation and education. As advocates of family-centered care, child life specialists work in partnership with doctors, nurses, social workers and others to meet the unique emotional, developmental and cultural needs of each child and family. At this hospital, she covers all areas of the hospital that deal with children. Peggy collaborates with families and other health care providers to:

- Prepare children for medical procedures or treatment using language that children understand
- Introduce coping strategies to help reduce anxiety and enhance cooperation with the health care team
- ♦ Provide support and distraction during medical procedures
- Offer opportunities for play and expressive activities, to encourage normal development and a sense of FUN in spite of challenging circumstances, and
- Promote family-centered care by providing information, advocacy and support in families of pediatric patients.

(In the pictures to the right, you can see the 'props' used to prepare children for such treatments as IVs, MRIs, CT Scans, and even transport and aerovac.)

In conjunction with this program, volunteers are used only in the activity room where arts and crafts are done. However the Auxiliary funds this program and is





involved in some of our other programs, such as:

- Escorting therapeutic dogs to hospital rooms
- Christmas party for chronically ill children – decorating and providing various games, Santa Claus, serving food
- NICU nannies that help in the NICU unit-holding babies
 feeding them
- They staff the Ronald McDonald room, where families of hospitalized children can get some respite away from the hospital room. They are



served coffee, snacks, soups, and soft drinks. There is a TV in the room for the family to watch and also a computer is available for their use.

through different treatment scenarios. Sessions are videotaped so caregivers can debrief afterward and identify opportunities for improvement. The simulation center gives

caregivers a good sense of what they may really experience in the field, said <u>Dr. David Smith</u>, Medical Director of Texas Health Fort Worth's trauma program.

"It's very real," Smith said.
"These sophisticated dummies actually breathe, they talk, they make facial expressions, they can cry,

District 6 was the 'kick off' point of the 2015 Traveling Trio Trip and offered a continental breakfast during registration followed by multiple activities to inform and entertain all present. There was a Mini-Vendor Fair (Mom's Madness, Indesign Fundraising, and Carson's) to visit, a wonderful skit about Alzheimer's, a Fashion Show featuring clothing from their own gift shop, and a wonderful



speaker, **Mindy Bannister**, a caseworker with the Abilene Regional Office of the North Central Texas Chapter of the **Alzheimer's Association**.

Mindy explained that all services provided by the Alzheimer's Association are FREE! They accept contributions from all over the world. Many communities sponsor walks or "fun runs" to raise funding for research and treatment of this not so uncommon disease. The "Still Alice" program is a free screening program available through the Alzheimer's Association. This is no small group of affected people. It affects around 5-5 1/2 MILLION in the United States. It affects 1 out of 8 over the age of 65 and is up to 40-50% over the age of 85. There is no cure at the present time, but there are some programs that seem to help. Mentioned were a Watercolor Art

Program, and most impressive was the **Music and Memory Program** which decreases agitation and pain. Period music, reminiscent for the individual patient is downloaded and delivered via iPods. The response of the patients was impressive. There is a grant program available. in pertinent information, this sensitive process honors the patient's values, goals and beliefs in making these life-affecting decisions. The process allows for future healthcare plans for any stage of illness to be in play to guide the medical care. End of life care is thoughtfully planned and not accomplished in the heat of the moment. The full article will appear in the next issue of the Outlook. Liliana De La Torre, Director of the Advance Care Planning and Bereavement program spoke on "Expanding Volunteer Roles" in light of these life care services.


