"But what does this have to do with me? I'm just a volunteer", you say.


You may not receive a salary or work 40 hours a week, but you do provide important services to very important people: the patients and their families, and the staff of your hospital, hospice, nursing home or other health care facility. It is to their benefit that you keep abreast of the 'goings-on' in health care practices and facilities where you provide crucial and welcomed services. As such, it is beneficial to you and your facility to attend some kind of 'practice update' yearly. Those you serve deserve to receive the best service you can render.

This organization, TAHV, is committed to providing opportunities to further the quality of volunteer-

ism. Many groups will work through fundraising or

bake sales to help members who want to attend Convention with transportation, registration and activities. However, the huge benefits of District Meetings are:

- They are 'local' (the state is divided into 10 districts, so there should be something in your 'area')
- It's limited to a one day meeting (no hotel costs)
- Registration Fees are usually \$35 or less (and covers a light breakfast and lunch) (Affordable)
- All attending volunteer groups provide reports of what they do at their facilities (great ideas for programs or fundraising opportunities to take back to your organization).
- Networking develops contacts with health care facilities in your own district (promoting camaraderie and cooperative programs)

#### District 5 Presidents' Council -Alive and Kicking

The District 5 Presidents' Council of Healthcare Auxiliaries was founded in 1945, not long after the TAHV statewide organization, which was established in 1941. Our members are current presidents, presidents-elect, and active past presidents representing twenty hospitals in north central Texas, from the Red River to Dallas/Fort Worth and reaching into west Texas. No paid coordinators or directors, except those from the host group, are included.

The District 5 Council has been functioning continuously since 1945, providing volunteer leadership an opportunity to share, learn, and support each other. The current Council enjoys getting together three times a year to share news and activities and getting to know the other presidents in our volunteer organizations. Members also keep each other up to date on changes in healthcare in our district, such as changes in hospital names or ownership and moves from non-profit to profit, and how these affect their volunteer organizations.

Each council volunteer group pays dues of \$35 a year, regardless of how many eligible members attend meetings. There are no expenses for attending meetings. Every group is required to take its turn hosting a meeting. Hosting occurs approximately every 6 years, and the host organization pays all expenses (food, venue, invitations, postage, speaker) for that event. Typically, there are usually between 40-50 attending. Like a mini-district meeting, members share their fund-raising and community outreach activities, hear a keynote speaker, and enjoy getting to know other presidents over lunch. New presidents benefit from the experience of past presidents, and the vast institutional knowledge in the room spans decades of volunteering in North Texas. In the past year, the Council heard guest speakers from Patriot Paws (training assistance dogs for veterans), Final Salute (a solemn and respectful ceremony to honor veterans who pass away in our hospitals), and the Dallas Medical Examiner's office.

The presidency of Presidents' Council rotates among the member groups with every group being given the choice of accepting or declining having a nominee. Depending on the size of Presidents' Council, each group will have that opportunity every 15-20 years.

Here is a call to action for all volunteer presidents: if your hospital is a TAHV member in District 5 and not a member of Presidents' Council, come join us! If you are in another district and interested in establishing a Presidents' Council, just ask us! #### **Past Presidents Award**

I was so pleased to receive enough entries for the Past President's Awards to be able to announce winners in all three categories: Outstanding Achievements in Hospital/Hospice In-service, Community Service, and Fundraising. Considerable work goes into these projects. In addition to highlighting this year's winners, I would like to review the requirements so that many of you will consider entering a project for next year. We can all learn from one another, and perhaps your special project might help another volunteer group to organize a similar program for their facility or community. A winning submission takes planning, but first you must identify an original and outstanding event or program that your auxiliary/volunteer group participates in. I hear some unique ideas presented at District Meetings that would make a great submission! In writing up your entry, you must follow the guidelines and criteria by which each entry is judged. More detailed information/rules can be accessed on the TAHV website (www.tahv.org). If you look down the left hand column to "Past Presidents Award" then check the bottom of your screen where it says: "What do you want to do with TAHV17AwardsGeneraRules.doc"... just click on the "Open" choice. Some of the information will be updated for next year's convention, but the general rules will be the same. It's a shame to have a great idea/project and fail to present it well.

Here are the basics:

There are 5 parts to each entry (each worth 2 points): 1) Identification (specific information about the project/ facility/volunteer group)

2) Description of Project (goals and objectives and need for the project)

3) Implementation of the Project (how many volunteers, their roles, steps to maintain project)

4) Evaluation of Project (show how objectives were met, what makes the project exceptional and deserving of this prestigious award)

5) Exhibits (photos, materials used, brochures, letters, newspaper articles or record keeping forms)

Each submission is evaluated by the same criteria. The judges look for the following:

- 1) How well the project meets its stated objectives.
- 2) How well the goals of the project are defined.

3) The value of the project to the hospital, hospice or community.

4) Innovation and creativity involved in the use of volunteers.

5) Organizational skills demonstrated in the development and implementation of the project.

6) The overall quality, clarity, neatness and organization of the entry presentation.

I'm looking forward to see what special programs might be presented and win at Convention 2018 in San Antonio!!!
