Prioritizing Children's Health in 2018

Because the foundation of an individual's health and well-being is

laid in early childhood, programs that invest early in a child's development yield lifelong positive results for individuals and communities. Studies show that children who have health coverage through public programs like Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program, for example, achieve long-term positive outcomes not only in health, but also in educational performance, economic well-being and overall economic productivity.

Nonetheless, the 20-year old Children's Health Insurance Program is on the brink of extinction as the U.S. Congress has not appropriated funds for its long-term continuation. Nationally, the program provides low-cost health coverage through a state and federal partnership to more than 9 million children nationwide and about 370,000 pregnant women. In Texas, 400,000 children depend on CHIP for preventive, primary and specialty health care services, and 35,000 pregnant women rely on it for a healthy pregnancy.

Federal funding for CHIP expired at the end of September. The full U.S. House of Representatives and a U.S. Senate committee have passed similar versions of a bill that would fund CHIP for five years through 2022. Unfortunately, the full Congress has only appropriated short-term funding to keep the program operational through March.

In a state that already leads the nation with the most residents without health insurance, Congress risks adding a significant number of children to the uninsured population. More importantly, it risks undermining the long-term health and well-being of our nation's most valuable resource.

Given all that CHIP offers to Texas children, families and health care providers, Congress needs to take quick action to continue CHIP funding.

Using Junior Volunteers ... Let Me Count the Ways

One of the highlights of the Volunteer year at Hendrick Medical Center is the arrival of the Junior Volunteers who serve during the summer. Marsha Brigman, Volunteer Coordinator, polls the different departments of the hospital to find those areas that would benefit from having a junior

volunteer to serve in their department. Each student sends in an application and then calls to request an interview with Marsha. During the interview Marsha asks questions about the student's interests to determine where to assign each junior volunteer. This year we have 69 junior volunteers. Of those sixty-nine, four are back for their third summer and another thirteen are back for their second summer. Their ages range from fourteen to eighteen.

Areas of service include the Education department, doctors' offices, Hendrick Hospice, Hendrick Housecalls, and Accounting where the students provide clerical support. For patients checking in for outpatient tests or surgery,

the juniors transport the patents to their required area by wheelchair. They work in the Emergency Department helping the techs and observing. Some fill in at the Information Desk or work in the Gift Shop, giving our full-time volunteers a break over the summer. Some work as a barista in the First Perk Coffee bar. Others work in Central Supply, wearing scrubs and protective gear, as they fulfill orders for medical

supplies that different areas of the hospital request. In Pediatrics, the juniors assist the Child-Life Specialist and in the NICU and neo-natal nursery, the students fill bags of goodies for the new mothers. One student who is interested in

becoming a pharmacist is getting some hands-on experience in the outpatient pharmacy. In the inpatient Rehab hospital, juniors are helping to reorganize a kitchen area, and at the Hendrick Health Club fitness

center, junior volunteers are providing childcare for children during the time their Mom or Dad is working out. Other students take a "snack cart" around through the hospital to waiting areas and nurses' stations, selling drinks and snacks to those waiting with patients or working on the floor. Proceeds from the snack cart are given by the Junior Volunteers to the Children's' Miracle Network during the telethon in August. Over the eight weeks that they will serve, these junior volunteers will provide over 3000 hours of service. We at Hendrick are proud of our Junior Volunteers and grateful for their service!


How They've Grown!!!

Surviving Hurricane Harvey.....

As we watched the homes of our family and friends in Houston fill with water, I'm not sure we expected what was coming for us in Southeast Texas. Torrential rain came, followed by the opening of dams a little farther north. We just couldn't hold all that water.

The hospital began making a plan to work with limited staff. They sent home all volunteers and any staff they could try to manage without for a short time. This allowed these individuals to make plans for their own homes and families while also conserving the hospital emergency resources. This procedure started the week of August 25th. Volunteers were finally able to return to their duties on September 7th.

With a volunteer force of around 200, many of our volunteers (as well as our staff) suffered great losses. People who lived in the same house for 40 years without a drop of water making inside found their house in 5 to 8 feet of water. Volunteers in their 90s who lived and worked in the same city for most of their lives were faced with the possibility of relocating and starting over from scratch. And people who were blessed enough to escape the storm and flooding, helped with

displaced family members searching for dry ground. After helicopter, boat, and firetruck rescues were complete, everyone looked around and the wreckage and started making plans for a fresh start.

The help that was needed seemed impossible to provide but the random acts of kindness seemed to go a long way to heal our volunteers' hearts. This came in the form of food for the family members providing clean up, dry clothes and sneakers, and just a message to say we are thinking of you and here for you. Volunteers reached out to their fellow volunteer family to provide whatever comfort they could. The Volunteer Auxiliary also helped by collecting names of volunteers most affected by the storm and offering them a VISA gift card. The card didn't remodel their homes or replace their cars. The recipients of the gift cards sent back notes of thanks for even the smallest needs that were met like a blankets and other basic needs. These items went a long way to bring people normalcy and comfort again. It's not over by any means. The hospital is back up and

running. All but a handful of our volunteers have returned now. They live with relatives, live in homes that have been taken down to the studs and concrete, or new apartments they have moved on to. And still with all of these stresses and disappointments they return to us every week to give of their time to people who need them. We wait for contractors to get to us, plead with SBA loan granters, and remind ourselves to be thankful for all we have.
