





## Honor and Dignity – The Final Salute

Goosebumps...leaky eyes...pride...respect...memories. These were my reactions as Linda Sconyers of Texas Health Arlington Memorial Hospital shared the story of their Final Salute program in a concurrent session at Convention. Starting with Lee Greenwood singing "God Bless the USA" and followed by a video of the hospital procession honoring the deceased veteran, Linda riveted the audience with her presentation.

Offered to veterans and their families, the program pays respect to veterans of the US Armed Forces who spend their last days at the hospital. The patient's body is draped with the American flag, and a small honor guard of hospital employees and volunteers who are trained in the protocol, escort the body in a silent procession with the family. An announcement is made over the hospital intercom, and hospital staff able to leave their posts, volunteers and often visitors gather as the procession stops in the hospital atrium. After a moment of silence, the name of the deceased is announced with his or her rank and branch of service. Many of those gathered in the atrium place their hands over their hearts. The procession leaves the building and the body is placed in the funeral home vehicle. The flag is folded and presented to the family in honor and recognition of their loved one.

The program was designed by Chaplain Jim Dorsey and a cross-functional team of hospital employees and volunteers, including Linda Sconyers and Shirley Volluz, a past

president of TAHV. Linda described how they worked together to gain support and work out the details of implementation. Micki Roemer, the current president of volunteers, talked about how the volunteers have stayed involved. I am most impressed by the commitment and dedication of the team — since its inception in 2015, they have participated in hundreds of honor escorts and helped spread the program to other hospitals in Texas and other states.

#### **Fun Facts from Convention Registration**

A total of **396** Volunteers and Volunteer Managers attended Convention in San Antonio, representing **75** hospitals from across Texas.

#### Which districts had the most attendees?

Not surprisingly, our host **District 8** around San Antonio had the most attendees: **99 District 5** – Dallas/Fort Worth area: **84**; **District 9** – Houston area: **66**; **District 3** – Corpus Christi area: **65** 

#### Which district had the highest hospital representation?

**District 3** with **58%** - volunteers from 14 of 24 TAHV member hospitals attended Convention.

#### Which hospital sent the most attendees?

Texoma Medical Center in Denison – 30, followed closely by; Guadalupe Regional Medical Center in Seguin – 26.

#### How many newcomers?

**92** – about a quarter of the attendees came to their **first** convention.

#### Who traveled the farthest?

Our friends from El Paso hold this record – volunteers from the Hospitals of Providence Memorial and Sierra campuses and Del Sol Medical Center traveled over 500 miles to attend Convention in San Antonio. Next up are the hardy souls from Wadley Regional Medical Center in Texarkana at 440 miles, and University Medical Center in Lubbock at 395 miles.
