Texoma Medical Center has launched a new project: The Comfort Cart, which is stocked by the volunteers and it "visits" all floors with the help of the hospital staff. The cart contains toiletries, crayons and coloring books, pens and paper, games ... anything that a patient might need or want during their stay.

Keeping in touch? Shannon Medical Center (San Angelo) conducted their monthly board meeting via a conference call! Fun! "Best attendance we have ever had. Back to Basics

The threat of Coronavirus seems to be getting every-body's attention. Back in late February a doctor at the Center for Disease Control (CDC) said it had not reached pandemic status. The doctor went on to say that it was "not a question of IF, but WHEN" and of course, now it is!!!

There's a simple way to help prevent the spread of disease, and most of us have been practicing it since we were small children—washing our hands.

As volunteers in hospitals, most of us have had training in hand hygiene. That's why it may be a good time to review procedures to keep us and those we care for safe. Cleaning your hands after touching a patient or the patient's immediate environment reduces the spread of potentially harmful germs to other patients. It

also lowers the risk of infection caused by germs or viruses acquired from patients, their families or friends to us. The CDC says alcohol-based hand sanitizers are the next most effective products for reducing the number of germs on the hands of healthcare providers. It's the preferred method for cleaning your hands in most routine hospital situations that we might face.



But back to what we were taught by our mothers: The CDC also says to wash your hands with soap and water whenever they are visibly dirty, before eating, and after using the restroom. Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Didn't bring a timer with you? Sing (or hum) the "Happy Birthday" song twice.

Do your part to keep yourself, your patients, your family, and the hospital staff as healthy as possible—wash your hands!

FEBRUARY – More Red than Just Valentine's Day



Baylor St. Luke's Medical Center Auxiliary members raised awareness of heart disease during February, "American Heart Month", by handing out red ribbons in the lobby and pinning them on nurses, staff, and patients on the heart floors.

The Center for Disease Control says that heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women of most racial and ethnic groups in the United States. Coronary heart disease is the most common type and the CDC estimates that 18.2 million adults, ages 20 and up, have it! Another staggering fact is that someone in the U.S. has a heart attack every 40 seconds! The five major symptoms of heart attack are:

- * chest pain or discomfort
- * feeling weak, light- headed or faint, with cold sweat
- * pain or discomfort in jaw, neck or back
- * pain or discomfort in one or both arms or shoulders
- * shortness of breath

American Heart Month has a Texas connection! President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed the event, which first took place in February 1964.



TWO SPECIAL PARTNERSHIPS

The Medical City McKinney Volunteer Auxiliary is involved in two special partnerships that support the auxiliary's mission of supporting the hospital and providing philanthropic gifts to the community. Both partnerships are in their infancy but are highly appreciated and well-received.

We discussed efforts to expand the auxiliary's outreach to the community and wanted to put some of the funds to work. We reached out to McKinney ISD and asked to be connected to a school that didn't have a business or church partner. Within minutes we received a telephone call to contact the **Arthur H. McNeil Elementary School**. The school opened in 2001 and serves a diverse population of over 460 students. The campus mix is 46% ethnic minorities and has an economically disadvantaged population of 30%. They definitely needed assistance to fill urgent food security needs and provide school supplies to students who couldn't afford them. Two weeks after the Board meeting, we were back-to-school shopping and the first year provided over \$400 of school supplies for opening day.

Since that first day we have provided over \$500 of school supplies each August. How?

* We make Christmas goodie bags filled with snacks, puzzles, games, and toiletries

- * We build meals in Thanksgiving food boxes – enough for 6-10 families and
- * We provide boxes of snacks throughout each year to supply the after-school program.

Our second partnership came to us in 2019 – The Binky Patrol of North Texas.

The Binky Patrol is a national nonprofit made up of talented volunteers. They hand-make blankets and guilts for newborns and children up to age 18 for selected healthcare facilities in North Texas. The Binky Patrol is a compassionate group of women and a perfect partner for the auxiliary. Since May 2019 they've provided over 350 pieces (blankets, quilts, isolet covers, infant caps) that we've delivered to the hospital's Women's & Children's Services department. The quilts and blankets are made with love and each is distinctive. In turn, the auxiliary has donated funds for the purchase of fabric, fleece, and yarn. This perfect partnership brings joy to parents of newborns and others. The Binky Patrol says they provide children the warmth and security of a soft, new, handmade blanket made with love! A partnership made in heaven!

Texas hospital volunteers provide a kind word, a smile and a listening ear when Texans need it most. An extension of hospital




