Deli or packaged meat	Commercial Salad Dressing (sugar, high fructose corn syrup)

When choosing your fruits and vegetables, some are better than others. It has to do with exposure to chemicals and the thickness of their skins and likelihood of absorbing herbicides or pesticides. Here's what I've seen and try to remember when I'm shopping. Some produce is OK to choose the regular products, **NOT** in the organic section of your favorite store, but some are better for you if you choose organic. I've heard this from many experts. They call them the 'clean 15' and the 'dirty dozen'.

With the biggest holiday of the year coming, good choices can make a difference to us all. One of the people I follow says there's nothing recipe=wise you can't have if you just substitute for the more toxic ingredients. You can use grass fed butter, or for salads or cooking, use extra-virgin olive oil or avocado oil. Use fresh fruits, and natural sweet sources like honey, maple syrup, stevia, or monk fruit. As long as you use healthy ingredients, you can make all of grandma's favorite recipes. A Merry Christmas to you all. Treat your body well!!!
